


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
WITH GUNS. EAGE

Author, senior journalist and editor-in-chief of *Kashmir Central* Bashir Assad spoke strongly about the paradigm shift in the Valley since 2019, during a conference in London on August 5, 2023, marking the commemoration of the 4th anniversary of the abrogation of Article 370 of the Constitution of India. We share the core of his speech with you.



OT WITH STANDING the contesting claims by the contending stakeholders, Kashmir, over the past five or six years, has been witnessing a groundbreaking shift, and all, for good reason. Without going into the constitutionality or legality of the abrogation of Article 370 of the Constitution by the BJP government in 2019, one could clearly assess how the situation on ground has changed. This was stated by renowned author and journalist Bashir Assad in a conference in London on August 5, 2023 on the occasion of commemoration of the 4th anniversary of the abrogation of Article 370 of the Constitution of India.

While speaking on the occasion, Bashir Assad said that two important events could be attributed to the shift in Kashmir. First, it was the infamous agitation of 2016 in the aftermath of the killing of a terrorist commander - Burhan Wani - in July 2016. The violent agitation consumed hundreds of lives in police retaliation; hundreds more were left injured and properties damaged on a massive scale. The narrative propagated by the adversaries was that of 'abhi nahin to kabhi nahin' (now or never). The intention was to scale up the violence to a level so as to bring the State to its knees. Every attempt was made to hurt the State. However, by the end of October, it only turned out



to be a self-driven goal, selfdestructive and self-defeating. People started feeling the jolts of the violence and the undercurrents immediately set in. It was for the first in the three decades of violent turmoil that people started questioning the legitimacy of the violent narrative driven by the hardliner separatist, the hawkish Syed Ali Shah Geelani. The agitation of 2016 finally demolished the larger-than-life image of Geelani and other separatists who were fishing in troubled waters for the last 30 long years without being answerable to anyone. The people got disillusioned with the separatism and separatist leaders. The 2016 violent agitation was actually the turning point. The separatists were now on public scanner.

Two, the abrogation of Article 370 of the Indian Constitution on August 5, 2019 by the Parliament was the final nail in the coffin. Though it came as a shock because of the hype created around the Article by the political class of Kashmir, but the immunity to absorb this surprising development was already there, owing to the disillusionment with the separatist narrative. This is



something very interesting which we should appreciate. People had lost hope in separatism after the events of 2016 and there was no question of going back to violence.

That said, the post abrogation administrative measures of tightening the noose around the separatists, blocking hawala channels used for fuelling the unrest in Kashmir, demolishing the terror ecosystem, identifying the terror apologists and cleansing of the system changed the scenario altogether.

There were attempts by Pakistan and its progenies to internationalise the events. However, it could not find many takers as the global community incidentally had

more challenging situations. The issues the West and the East were facing were far graver than the noises around Kashmir and eventually were lost in the din. However, the western media consistently tried to fix New Delhi for what it terms 'suppressing the voices' in Kashmir.

Bashir Assad said that
Article 370 which had suffered
so many erosions, was hardly
existent. It was just a tool in
the hands of political elites
for emotional exploitation of
the people of Kashmir. That
said, there are some legitimate
concerns which need to be
addressed to remove the
misgivings and it is incumbent
upon the government of the
day to give the sense of security

and belongingness to the people of Kashmir. Bashir Assad described abrogation of Article 370 as a momentous step taken by the central government with respect to Kashmir.

In his well articulated speech, Bashir pointed, "The era of separatism is over in Kashmir. Gone are the days when people like Syed Ali Shah Geelani were handling Kashmir affairs through their indoctrination and forceful protest calendars".

Bashir Assad added, "There is behavioural transformation in Kashmir, more than anything else. People have been behaving responsibly. The undercurrent has been there since 2016; people had started realising the futility of violence, there was this deep realisation that the violence had destroyed two generations and peace must be given a chance to save the third generation. The abrogation of Article 370 has, at least, led to the discrediting of the separatists and the separatist narrative. People have also been watching the events unfolding in Pakistan since the last many years very carefully. A failed state which could not save its own people cannot be the saviour of Kashmir and the Kashmiris! Because Kashmiris are aspirational people, there is a shift in the thought process. They want to explore the huge opportunities which this vast nation offers."

Post abrogation, Kashmir is also witnessing a sea change in the administrative response to the issues of socio-economic concern.





Bashir added, "I am not against the transition of separatists into mainstream and for accepting the idea of India but I have my strong reservation towards those mainstream leaders who want separatists to be stakeholders in electoral machinations. Visiting the separatists and portraying them as messiahs of the society is an orthodox stunt which has no takers after the events of 2019".

He reiterated that the annulment of Article 370 has restored order in Jammu and Kashmir and has cleansed the system which was hijacked by subversive elements. With the separatist structure coming to a close, the people are living a peaceful life without any pressure from inside or across the Border.

"The abrogation of Article 370 was an unprecedented move by the Union Government as it broke away the active terror system in the Valley and the emanating threats. It contained

violence and helped establish boom in the economy of Kashmir. Now there are greater opportunities for economic upliftment in the Valley," he said.

"Kashmir has a history of being moderate and peaceful. Kashmir offered the world the culture of Sufism and diversity. It has an inclusive history and plurality. Today, with the abrogation, the thought process has been mainstreaming and the idea of a peaceful Kashmir is for all to see," added Bashir.

The event was attended by a number of dignitaries from London including British MP Bob Blackman, Lord Rami Ranger, Stefan Voloseni, Chuni Lal Chawda, Krishna Bhan and Dr. Vijay Sazawal from the US-Kashmir Forum.

Bashir Assad is a renowned author from the Valley who has written a number of books on the politics of Kashmir. His latest ones include 'Kashmir Beyond Article 370' and 'K File' in which he enlightens about the stereotypical narrative of Kashmir running on a grinding machine of disinformation and concocted accounts. unrelentingly flowing across from the Border. His emphasis remains on the new discourse and narrative from Kashmir. He is an avid articulator of new perspectives and the socio-politico economic boom happening in Kashmir after the annulment of Article 370.

His ideology reflected in his speech in which he maintained that the beneficiaries of the new Constitutional changes in J&K shall be all of us - us as in our loved ones, our society – all of Kashmir that wants to live an abundant, enriched and peaceful life away from the dance of guntrotting, penetrating hands from Pakistan.



HE recent removal of the top two commanders overseeing China's nuclear arsenal, reveals serious fractures in Chinese leader Xi Jinping's regime and will harm its military modernisation, according to analysts.

Last week, Gen, Li Yuchao, commander of the People's Liberation Army (PLA) Rocket Force, and Xu Zhongbo, political commissar, the branch's second in command Chinese leader Xi Jinping's recent purge of top military leaders and that too, pretty mysteriously, reveals major crisis within the Chinese Communist Party (CCP) and can play a crucial role in harming its military modernisation. An analysis.

were purged from their posts after having disappeared from public view for months. The reason for their dismissal and their current whereabouts are unknown.

Mr. Xi installed former deputy navy chief Wang Houbin as the new commander on July 31, while Xu Xisheng, an air force officer and member of the Chinese Communist Party's elite Central Committee, was promoted to political commissar.

Notably, both men come from outside the branch and have no experience in the Rocket Force, the arm of the PLA responsible for the country's nuclear arsenal and ballistic missiles. Analysts say their installation will likely jeopardise the regime's warfighting ability, as it increasingly

seeks to challenge the US and Russia's nuclear forces.

General Li and Xu Zhongbo's disappearance was among several leaders in the Rocket Force to have gone missing in recent months, presumed to be under investigation, signalling a wholesale purge of the branch's top brass. These include Lt. Gen. Liu Guangbin, deputy commander of the Rocket Force, and Lt. Gen. Zhang Zhenzhong, former deputy commander of the Rocket Force, according to Germany-based sinologist Frank Lehberger.

Besides the disappearances, the death of Gen. Wu Guohua, 66, former deputy commander of the force, on July 4, which was only confirmed by the Chinese state media in late July, has led many to speculate that the purges were due to corruption or the leaking of military secrets.

Three weeks after his death, Chinese state media reported that General Wu had died of an unspecified illness. His death was earlier reported by overseas Chinese-language media, fuelling speculation that the general had killed himself.





DISAPPEARANCES AND DEATHS

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The purges came at a time of much upheaval within the opaque Chinese Communist Party (CCP). "There is more than meets the eye in the recent changes in the PLA Rocket Force, especially at a

CORRUPTION



Nishakant Ojha, an India-based geopolitical analyst, believes the purge of the Rocket Force's entire command is linked to a crackdown on corruption. "The Rocket Force may have failed to meet certain high-level goals," Ojha told The Epoch Times, adding that this may have prompted an investigation into where the money went. A July 28 report by South China Morning Post, citing unnamed sources, said several top PLA Rocket Force generals had been investigated for corruption by the military watchdog for months, including the force's current commander, Li Yuchao, and deputies Zhang Zhenzhong and Liu Guangbin. Ojha likened the situation to the corruption probe of China's state-backed semiconductor investment fund, known as "Big Fund," this past year that led to multiple top executives, including the fund's former president detained on graft charges.

INTELLIGENCE LEAK



For He Qinglian, a prominent US-based Chinese economist and commentator, the shake-up was the result of a leaking of military secrets that came to light when the US Air Force think tank published a report on



the PLA Rocket Force.

The report described the organisational structure of the Rocket Force, a branch known for its secretary, with a remarkable level of detail, prompting analysts including He Qinglian to conclude it was leaked by senior officials of the force.

"It is not too difficult to grasp this kind of information," she said, noting that the US intelligence services routinely recruited Chinese informants.

"What's more, the CCP has always strictly dealt with this kind of espionage that undermines national security - in line with the principle of 'killing a thousand rather than letting one go," she said, referring to a quote by former Chinese leader Mao Zedong. He Qinglian said she's reminded of previous similar incidents like the 2010 purge during which the CCP dismantled a CIA espionage operation inside China by

executing or imprisoning dozens of informants over a period of two years.

MULTIPLE FACTORS

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Some analysts have noted that Xi's replacement of the Rocket Force command occurred not long after the Russian Wagner mutiny of late June, directed against President Vladimir Putin. Lehberger called Putin a close personal friend of Xi Jinping and said that the Russian mutiny was believed to have shaken the Chinese leader to the core. While this is unconfirmed, Lehberger noted that "the peculiar timing and the haste with which the replacement inside the PLA has taken place" lends some credence to the speculation, especially taking into account that Xi has likely faced coup threats during his tenure. "Hence some commentators

dub the whole affair as 'China's Wagner moment," he said.

The Rocket Force, the PLA's newest branch created by Xi during his sweeping military reforms in 2015, oversees precision missiles that are aimed at both stationary and moving targets anywhere in Taiwan, Japan, India and the US territories in the Pacific like Guam, Wake Island, Hawaii, as well as in continental America, said Lehberger. "Most (nonnuclear) precision missiles, controlled by the [Rocket Forces] could hypothetically also be targeted by hypothetical future Chinese coup plotters at Xi Jinping himself. Thus becoming hypothetically a sure and error-proof way [of] eliminating Xi as China's leader ... very much unlike the botched coup by Wagner mercenaries, only armed with regular firearms, who were targeting Vladimir Putin in Moscow," he said.

Lehberger also said that the CCP's recent messaging, targeting the PLA, revealed the causes behind the purge. According to him, Xi's speeches since July 24 and the various editorials published in CCP's state media, highlight four main problems in the military. "Lack of ethics among the PLA, lack of supervision of the PLA, formation of factions inside the PLA and active divulging of military top-secrets by the PLA," he said.

The first two factors can be linked to corruption and various forms of ethical misconduct, the latter two are serious and political and treasonous offenses that are directly threatening the survival of the CCP regime and Xi personally, according to the sinologist. "These four points corroborate my assessment that this whole affair is not only due to corruption or behaviour or ethical misconduct, but that Xi's status as autocratic leader of China is also threatened," said Lehberger.

IMPACT ON PLA'S WAR-FIGHTING ABILITY

The appointment of two outsiders to lead the PLA Rocket Force (PLARF), with the commander from the Navy and his deputy from the Air Force, has raised the eyebrows of analysts. "All this shows that Xi Jinping has not only a huge problem of discipline within

the PLA, but also has serious problems finding officers that he can trust," said Arpi, the India-based historian.

Lehberger said that Gen. Wang's appointment was not only peculiar, but also detrimental to the Rocket Force's war fighting capability. He cites Gen. Wang's official biography, which states he started his career as a low-level officer in the PLA Navy's Air Force Detachment. Wang was more like a bureaucrat who never flew airplanes at the time, thus gaining no flying experience. Later he became an officer at the staff headquarters of the PLA Navy. As such, he was also never involved in a command of a warship, therefore lacking practical experience. "Wang was only commended for being a loyal, docile and

hardworking officer in the staff headquarters. Paradoxically it were those qualities, coupled with his total lack of technical or professional know-how, which did play a crucial role for Xi picking Admiral Wang Houbin as new PLARF commander, "said Lehberger.

The general's lack of relevant experience will be especially damaging to the Rocket Force because, according to Lehberger, the force is much larger than other branches and it's essential that it be led by a commanding officer with specialised knowledge of ballistic missiles. "Moreover the main adversary of the PLARF is the formidable US Strategic

Nuclear Force, which forces the PLARF not to commit any kind of amateurish mistake with possibly catastrophic repercussions for the CCP," the expert said.

"A novice and outsider like Gen. Wang Houbin as head of the PLARF will therefore only elicit angry contempt and insubordination from the officer corps and the rank and file, in turn increasing the suspicions and paranoia of Xi," he added, describing this as a "vicious cycle".

The massive shake-up of the forces that Xi personally created indicates that the Chinese leader's reforms of the military, which commenced in 2015, is facing serious and unprecedented trouble, according to Lehberger. "This is corroborated by the fact that apart from a handful of high PLA officers who he knows personally for decades, Xi never trusts anyone else inside the PLA officer corps; he is visibly uncomfortable when meeting with PLA officers or with ordinary rank and file," he said.

Xi created both the Rocket Forces and the PLA Strategic Support Force, responsible for psychological, cyber, and information warfare, in December 2015. "Xi staffed them with handpicked officers, carefully vetted for their loyalty to him personally," he said.



While the education system in Jammu & Kashmir is on the fast track to revival after a long dead spell due to insurgency and turmoil, there is no denying the fact that there has been going on, a mass migration of Kashmiri students to colleges and universities away from home. And indeed, the educational institutes across India have been welcoming them with warmth and opportunity. N a world where education serves as the cornerstone of progress, access to quality learning opportunities is crucial for every individual, regardless of their background or geographical location. One such commendable initiative has been the welcoming embrace of Kashmiri students by mainland India's educational institutions.

Mainland India's higher education landscape has flourished over the years, offering myriad academic disciplines and programs across esteemed universities and colleges. Kashmiri students, driven by a thirst for knowledge, now have the privilege to select from a diverse range of courses spanning fields such as engineering, medicine, humanities, sciences, and social sciences.

THE HISTORY OF CHAOS

Jammu and Kashmir, a land marred so often by conflict and turmoil, bears scars. While education is widely recognised as a fundamental human right, it has regrettably been one of the hidden casualties of this prolonged conflict. The repercussions have been particularly harsh on the younger generation, who have endured a dangerous and unsettling situation for decades.

The enduring conflict spanning years has dealt a crippling blow to the region's education system. Countless

Financial constraints and staff shortages have forced the closure of over 3,000 adult and non-formal education centres in the region since 1990. The younger generation, born after 1990, has been often confined to their homes due to persistent violence and uncertainty, spending more time within their homes' four walls than in classrooms.

A REVIVAL SINCE 2019

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The education sector in Jammu and Kashmir has achieved significant progress, especially post the Article 370 abrogation. The government has been actively implementing various initiatives to enhance curriculum, introduce innovative projects, and expand educational capacity. Notably, 25,000 new seats across 50 colleges were added in a year, marking a historic increase. Emphasis is being placed on value-based education and individual growth, with a focus on blending evolving education needs with market dynamics. Efforts are underway to make quality education accessible to all, including the underprivileged. The implementation of the National Education Policy (NEP) is a major stride, making Jammu and Kashmir a pioneer in aligning its curriculum and methodologies with the NEP's



multidimensional approach. Dropout rates have decreased significantly, and the region's education infrastructure is undergoing a dynamic development, including colleges, universities, and schools. Overall, Jammu and Kashmir's education sector is on an upward trajectory post the Article 370 abrogation, reflecting a commitment to holistic growth and transformation. But this is an ongoing process.


EDUCATION AWAY FROM HOME

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Limited opportunities in the region have led to a 'mass migration' of students seeking higher education outside. Insufficient colleges, political turmoil, and infrastructural issues have pushed students away. The Prime Minister's

Special Scholarship Scheme (PMSSS) attracts many, covering tuition and hostel fees. Opportunities for students outside Kashmir have become increasingly appealing due to various factors. The region's limited educational infrastructure, political instability, and challenging environment have prompted many students to explore educational prospects beyond its borders, for better opportunities and a more conducive learning environment. Students are drawn to universities and colleges in northern Indian states, such as Punjab, Haryana, Chandigarh, Uttarakhand, Delhi, and Uttar Pradesh. These institutions offer a more extensive range of courses, better facilities, and exposure to a broader academic world. The PMSSS attracts students to universities outside Jammu and Kashmir, as it provides financial

support to cover tuition, hostel fees, and other expenses. Furthermore, the desire for exposure to diverse cultures and a global perspective has motivated Kashmiri students to study outside the region. Many believe that studying in more stable and academically enriched environments will provide them a competitive edge and broader horizons. Despite the challenges that come with studying away from home, such as adjusting to new climates and locations, the allure of better education and opportunities for personal growth remains a driving force. However, the situation also calls for addressing the issues faced by these students, ensuring transparent admission processes, equitable distribution of scholarships, and a supportive environment to enhance their overall educational experience.





BRIDGE TO CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

The influx of Kashmiri students into mainland India has paved the way for cultural exchange and strengthened national unity. By studying alongside peers from different states and backgrounds, these students are not only gaining academic insights but also imbibing a rich tapestry of cultures, languages, and traditions. This interaction contributes to the breaking down of stereotypes and fostering a sense of belonging among students.

Recognising the financial constraints that some Kashmiri families may face, many educational institutions in mainland India extend scholarships and financial aid to deserving students. These initiatives aim to make education more accessible, ensuring that no aspiring scholar is held back due to economic limitations. Mainland India's institutions provide an environment conducive to social integration and personal growth. Students from Kashmir are encouraged to participate in extracurricular activities, clubs, and organisations, allowing them to showcase their talents,

build friendships, and develop essential life skills. One of the primary goals of higher education is to prepare students for meaningful and fulfilling careers. Varied universities in India collaborate with industries and businesses to offer internships, workshops, and seminars, thus providing Kashmiri students a platform to hone their practical skills and establish professional connections. While the educational opportunities for Kashmiri students in mainland India are undeniably promising, it is crucial to acknowledge and address the unique challenges they may face. Adapting to a new environment, language barriers, and homesickness can be obstacles, but with proper support systems in place, these challenges can be overcome.

FIRST PERSON

We speak to a few students and teachers on the changing face of education in Kashmir as well as on the aspect of studying away from home. Meanwhile Ajaz Ahmad, a government school teacher in Srinagar, expresses his enthusiasm over the opportunities for



motivate me".


